The complaint procedure addresses consistent patterns of gross and reliably attested violations of all human rights and all fundamental freedoms occurring in any part of the world and under any circumstances.

Please detail, in chronological order, the facts and circumstances of the alleged violations including dates, places and alleged perpetrators and how you consider that the facts and circumstances described violate your rights or that of the concerned person(s).

I was a Computer Science Professor at Armstrong Atlantic State University (now, campus of Georgia Southern University) in Savannah, GA, USA from 2000 to 2004 on tenure track. In April 2004, I obtained my tenure and in May I had an interview at the U.S. Consulate in Italy to obtain my green card. I resulted HIV-positive and the green card was denied because of the HIV immigration ban. So, I was forced to resign from my job. When I accepted it, I was a lecturer at Sapienza University of Rome and did not resign since I was allowed to be on leave. So, I am still there as a lecturer with my career compromised by this story. As you might know, the ban was lifted in 2010 but I could not get a second chance in the U.S. This year would have been, very likely, the last one in Savannah before retirement. At this point I wonder how I can get paid for these fifteen "forced sabbatical" years. Sean Strub founder of the SERO project, a network of people with HIV and allies fighting for freedom from stigma and injustice, told me this case is a landmark litigation to file and suggested me to contact hiv legal groups. I contacted Immigration Equality, which fought to lift the ban ten years ago. They answered this type of litigation is outside their practice area. However, they specified it should be filed against the government. Therefore I decided to contact Lambda Legal, another grous focused on defending the right of hiv positive people in the U. S. They said they are not in the position to assist me and gave me a list of lawyers to call for assistance on this matter. They did not guarantee this kind of litigation is going to succeed and, on top of that, I guess I do not have the resources to pursue this claim. Sean Strub told me that if the hiv legal groups are not interested in the case, he is not sure what Sero can do. I decided to write to you because I know that UNAIDS promotes the lift of the hiv immigration and travel ban in every country. I would like to point out that, in my case, the ban was not applied at the moment that I tried to enter in the U.S. but after I spent four years of my life there, where I worked full time honestly getting my tenure and promotion at the end of my track (during the last two years, I was even the coordinator of the Master program in Computer Science at the University). This is why I think this can be considered human right violation and I would like to have your opinion.
